WHAT WE FOUND IN THE GARDEN




Volunteer Arthur Wilson (see below) found this baby bunny in the vegetable garden and relocated it outside the fence.

last month. He participated in many seasonal chores including planting raspberries and weed whacking in the edible forest. When waiting to board a bus for home, he said the most surprising thing he learned was how hard farmers work!

HOW DO WE PROTECT THE VEGETABLES





Over the years we've learned how to protect young vegetable seedlings from pests. Early on we observed crows using their beaks to pull out each inch-high blade of corn to eat the kernel below. Young Zucchini seedlings were attacked by cucumber beetles. Now we cover both with floating row cover to conceal them from these pests until they outgrow the threat, corn when it is about 4 inches tall and squash when it begins to flower and needs to be uncovered to have access to pollinators.

WHY WE LEAVE THE CATERPILLARS





Used to be if we saw a caterpillar nest (left) we would destroy it not realizing we were destroying food for birds. Now we leave the nest which the birds eventually find and destroy (right), using the contents to feed their young. Rarely do the caterpillars cause significant damage to their host plant.
