# WHAT'S READY TO PICK IN THE EDIBLE FOREST







Plums, daylilies and rose hips (the fruit of roses) are all ripe and ready to pick. Daylilies are curnchy-sweet and attractive in salads.. Rose hips, high in Vitamin C, can be eaten fresh, made into jelly or dried and brewed in a nutritive tea.

WHAT IS A TRAP CROP



A trap crop is a plant that is more attractive to pests than another crop more valuable to the gardener. Here, rose hips are more attractive to chipmunks than nearby plums (see remains of rose hips on "chimpmunk table" above) and elderberries are more attractive to birds than nearby ripening grapes.
